

John came from Trinidad about ten years ago. In Trinidad he had raised orchids and participated in orchid shows but felt there was much more to learn. After arriving in Florida he began growing many plants that had not been available in Trinidad but he had trouble keeping them alive (don't we all?).

Finally he focused on Paphiopedilum because he was told he could not grow them! He met Jack Schendowich, Warren Kelly (Orchid World), Bob Skully (Jones & Skully) & Frank Smith (Krull- Smith) who has more AOS awards than any other grower; from these people he learned how to grow Paphiopedilums and many other types of orchids. Eventually he won his own AOS awards.

Today he owns over 500 Paphiopedilums and about 600 other orchids! While still learning about orchids John is also interested in encouraging others in becoming enthusiasts by sharing his almost 32 years of experience.

First stop was Orchidmania, where they laid out a fantastic lunch to welcome FLOS. The good news is that many of us found interesting additions to our collections. The bad news is that this may be our last time to visit there - the current owners are moving the growing operation to Hawaii and the fate of the Florida business is uncertain.

Next up was Tropiflora. This is always a favorite stop, especially for the bromeliad lover. They have just finished shipping 60,000 pounds of bromeliads to Singapore. Currently sitting embargoed, the plants will be used at the World Orchid Conference. And speaking of business succession, the good news is that Dennis and Linda's children are getting into the business so we should have many more visits. Venice Orchids was our last stop of the day. They offered many great deals on some rather amazing plants. A variety of cacti and bromeliads vied with the orchids for our attention. The owner was extremely generous with some of his huge specimens - nothing like an orchid society on the prowl for monsters to clear off one's growing benches! Some lucky members also got some freebie aloes, disproving the owner's previous thoughts that he couldn't even give'em away!

Sunday morning we hit one of our all time favorites: Palmer Orchids. We had a long time to browse and many treasures were discovered and purchased. Previous ramblers know we track purchases at each nursery, and Palmer's managed to hold onto more of our orchid money than any other grower.

Sunday lunch found us at Marie Selby Botanical Gardens in Sarasota, FL. A generous gift from our Orchid Society funded development of the Orchid Alcove, a stunning attention-getter when first entering the Conservatory. The space is dedicated to a display of orchids in bloom. Our donation is recognized by a beautiful brass plaque.

After introductions by the senior team of horticulturalists, we split into two groups for guided tours. One group toured the Conservatory where we saw the orchid alcove and heard about a few of Selby's plant heroics. A highlight included a rare Encyclia islense; a species discovered recently and brought to Selby. When they went back the entire area had been cleared and there were no more to be found. Another cluster has been found but this is one rare orchid! The second group went behind the scenes where we got to see the warm greenhouse and the "cool room". Many mountain orchids require cool nights for proper root development. With an enormous swamp cooler and constant air motion, their grower struggles to keep their cool growers alive through the hot season and then watches them thrive in the winter climate. By maintaining a very clean environment and using good horticultural practices he runs a very Eco-friendly greenhouse. Some physan20 is sometimes used but he does not do mass spraying. Our groups traded locations, so everyone got to see everything. Then we were treated to a fabulous luncheon spread. Yummy!

After lunch we had some time to wander and enjoy the beautiful bayside gardens and make more purchases. All too soon we were back in the bus and returning to Fort Lauderdale

with our plants all over the bus. It was a great trip and a great turnout. If you have never done an overnight ramble you should try the next one! It's a lot of fun.

Weird Pollinators

News of the weird — cricket pollinates orchids! You couldn't make this stuff up. It made the "Top 10 New Species of 2011" list even though it is only June... are scientists on a different calendar?

This species is the only pollinator of the rare/endangered orchid Angraecum cadetii on Réunion island (South Western Indian Ocean), representing the first clearly-supported case of orthopteran-mediated pollination in flowering plants. http://species.asu.edu/2011_species05

Scientists at Colombia's National University (UN) have discovered a new species of bee in the southern Colombian department of Nariño



that has a tongue twice the size of its body, according to monthly university publication UNPeriodico.

Euglossa natesi n. sp., also known as the "orchid bee" or "jewel bee," is a species recognized by scientists for its luminescent mix of blue, green, bronze and gold, as well as its abnormally large tongue. This new type of jewel bee found near the Ecuadorian border in southern Nariño, has what scientists at the National University are calling the largest tongue discovered thus far. http://colombiareports.com/colombia-news-lite/news/16937-new-bee-discovered-with-largest-tongue-in-world.html

Orchid Tip...

Peppermint oil & castille liquid soap (available at health food stores) makes a safe, effective pest control. Dilute 1-tsp per quart of water in a hand sprayer and spray infestations every few days until controlled. Works especially well against soft-bodied pests such as aphids and mealybugs.
