FEBRUARY MEETING: KEN & JUDY RUSS

Backyard Growing: This February, FLOS had the pleasure of having Ken & Judy Russ speaking with us about their experience of growing orchids in Southern Florida over 20 years. They live on a waterway, they affectionately refer to as "The Puddle". Here, they grow over a 1000 orchids, in a shade house, their lanai & a shade area, called the "Pine Forest." Since 2004, their orchids have received 32 AOS awards.

Let's get growing. Ken started the presentation by mentioning the vast variety of orchids that are available today. Over 25,000 orchid species, which are grouped into terrestrial and epiphytes. 80% of these are tropical. So, we here in Florida should be able to create a growing environment for a large number of species and their hybrids.

What is the name? Is the term, Ken used to establish a history. Create a birth certificate, an orchid log to add any & all information about your plants. This gives you information about the orchids, should you want to bring them into the society meeting, to show them off.

Orchids in the landscape. The next aspect of growing Ken discussed was the placement of our orchids for optimum culture for the naturalization of these beauties in the garden around your home. Eastern exposure is the best place to start. An area that will receive good light, but be protected from midday sun. Acclimatization is a main factor in adding orchids into a new environment; the gradual movement of plants to areas of higher light, or in some cases, less light. This time of year is best to time to make the move. The days are getting longer and the temperature is still comfortable. Ken encouraged us to experiment a bit, move them around and observe how they respond.

Light, air movement, water, fertilizer, potting medium, humidity & observation:

Environment, temperature and ventilation: Know your requirements. Pay attention, to provide your orchids with a quality growing environment. This is probably one of the most important aspects of growing orchids.

If you observe someone's success, growing with a certain medium or method, experiment with 1 or 2 plants to see how they respond to the new method.

Fertilizer, every two weeks at a rate of 2 tsp. per gallon with a balanced fertilizer. Ken & Judy use a bloom booster, again 2 tsp. per gallon, alternating applications every 2 weeks. They use a supplemental additive, Maxicrop, a seaweed extract. Once a month, this is added to the fertilizer spraying to stimulate root growth. 4 times a year, Epsom salt is applied to give orchids, any extra magnesium they may need to grow. This is applied at a rate of 2 tbsp. per gallon.

Observe, pay attention for signs of any bugs or infection. Thrips, mealy bugs, scale, aphids & ants are the culprits. Here is a link to the AOS page for treatment of these pests. http://www.aos.org/orchids/orchid-pests-diseases.aspx

Inspect & Isolate them: Ken mentioned that he inspects any newly acquired orchids. This is to prevent adding any problems to your collection or growing environment.

Secrets for good growing: Develop a routine: watering schedule. Use that fertilizer, be patient, it takes time to establish good culture... Experience is the best teacher. Come to the meetings and ask questions.

Grow'em & Show'em, I don't think that we will look at the bulk trash pile the same. As, Ken & Judy recycle old blinds and use them, as labels for their orchids. Remember to Educate, Experiment, Observe and be Patient. (Paul Gumos)


Keiki Club News


