


President's Message

MORE ON CATASETUM

"Catasetum orchids" is a generic term/family to describe in fact 4 different genera: **Catasetum** is the largest genus with close to 200 species but it also has a huge number of hybrids. They are the most common and easiest to grow.

Cycnoches has less than 40 species but many hybrids. Those are the

showiest flowers of all and among the most beautiful flowers in the orchid world!!! Nicknamed "Swan orchids" for a reason, they put on quite a show! They are tougher to grow as they rot easily. Hybrids are therefore a better choice to start as they are more rot resistant.

Mormodes has approx. 80 species. Depending on who you ask, they are considered extravagant, gorgeous, weird or ugly. They usually have saturated colors with VERY original shapes. They are less common in cultivation and much harder to grow as they rot very easily. Here too, hybrids are a safer bet.

Clowesia is the smallest genus with only 7 recognized species and not many hybrids. They were long considered Catasetums and were not a separate genus. They are easy to grow, have the most flowers in the group and longest lasting but their shapes and colors are more subdued.

The life cycle described in the previous article is true for all but Cycnoches which will bloom later in the season, Mormodes will typically bloom on leafless bulbs and so do half of the Clowesias. To get acquainted with these beautiful orchids you should start with Catasetums and a couple of Cycnoches hybrids.

Those 4 genera have all been inter bred to form inter generic hybrids whose names are self-explanatory. Some are highly successful while others have not produced any interesting results. Hybridizing is done to improve shape, colors, longevity of flowers, repeat blooms etc... It is basically a way to have "better orchids" (although personally, as a purist, I prefer species or primary hybrids).

Many attempts at hybridizing throughout the orchid world have been abandoned when the result does not improve the qualities of the parents or reduce their defects. In the Catasetum family, there are 3 successful inter-generic hybrids:

CycnoDes (Cycnoches X Mormodes): gorgeous shapes and deep colors. They usually bloom once in the Summer or Fall then once more when the plant goes dormant. Those are fairly common and highly prized orchids

ClowesEtum (Clowesia X Catasetum): these are very easy to grow and typically have picked up all the strengths of the parents and shed all the weaknesses

Mormodia (Mormodes X Clowesia): tend to be easy to grow, very floriferous and bloom late in the season. Their flowers are smaller but there are many of them!

There a few Catamodes (Catasetum X Mormodes) but the cross

is not considered successful as it does not really improve the qualities of the parents. Other crosses are considered marginal like Clowenoches (Clowesia X Cycnoches) and Catanoches (Catasetums X Cyncoches).

There are also 2 successful inter generic crosses, which combine 3 genera (those names are easy to spot as they usually have a proper name + the addition of the suffix –ARA):

(Marmadas V Clawasia V Ca

(Mormodes X Clowesia X Catasetum) are many and they are named after the American specialist of Catasetums EPED CL

cialist of Catasetums FRED CLARKE. He is the owner of Sunset Valley Orchids and has produced many hybrids over decades. He is the one who hooked me on orchids when he came to FLOS to share his experience during our monthly meeting.

MonnierARA (Catasetum X Cycnoches X Mormodes) has one very famous orchid: "Millenium Magic Witchcraft" which is black and you can usually get one at the Bonnet House show early December as this is often their peak season.

Next month we will talk about some peculiarities of the Catasetum world.

THE LITTLE ORCHID THAT COULD

Remember the childhood story about the Little Engine that Could? How it tried and tried and tried that hill?

Two months ago, I noticed that several of the pavers on my covered patio were raising up, one had a small corner piece broken off, and there was a small green shoot emerging. It looked very determined. Curious to see

what kind of weed could displace the heavy pavers, I decided to watch what developed. Pretty soon I realized that this was one of the so called "invasive" (naturalized) terrestrial orchids. It grew and grew and bloomed and bloomed, and is now nearly three feet tall. It was nowhere near the edge of the patio, and the pavers had been there for five years. How did it get there?

Curious about this determined little orchid, I asked Rich Ackerman if he knew the name and, of course, he did: eulophia graminea, also known as the "Crown Orchid." He had photos on his phone and knew the history. An Asian native species, eulophia graminea has spread widely across the world. First discovered locally in a mulched strip in a parking lot in Miami-Dade in 2007, it was then believed that this was the northern boundary of the orchid. Rich remembers when the first ones were discovered in Broward County. In the June 2008 FLOS newsletter, Dr. Pemberton of Fairchild Tropical Gardens challenged FLOS members to participate in an "Adult Science Project" looking for more examples of this orchid around South Florida. Eulophia graminea is now found as far north as southern Georgia, and there seems to be inter- Orchid Q&A national interest as well, judging by 2016 article in the Irish Orchid Society newsletter. Do they grow there too? They grow in a variety of habitats and conditions and are considered to be quite hardy.

I believe my example predates that 2007 discovery. When I purchased my home in 2008, there was a huge concrete patio on the west side of the house that had been there at least ten years. Between 2012 and 2013, I did some renovations, removing the concrete patio and building a large covered patio in a different location. Trying to make a garden where part of the old patio was, I kept digging up these funny looking small squished-looking oval shaped bulbs with roots attached, at least 50 of them. Had no idea what they were, but figured they were weeds. When a

friend said they were probably an invasive yard orchid that grows around here, I left a few in the ground, but they did nothing; so I eventually tossed them and never saw any more. We never found any examples when doing the massive site preparations for the covered patio and pool deck.

How did this small orchid survive all those years (at least six) under the patio pavers? What made it decide to sprout now? Last week I found another one pushing up the concrete seal against a nearby pillar. Will there be more? Only time will tell, but one thing's for sure: I REALLY wish the rest of my orchids were so determined to survive!
