OLIVIER SHARES HIS EXPERIENCES

SOME RANDOM THOUGHTS OF AN ORCHIDHOLIC:



The latest "Orchid Digest" (quarterly) had a very interesting section on the distinction between "subspecies" and "variety". These are two terms you sometimes encounter on orchid tags for species. Basically they explain that these two concepts apply to species which are very similar, yet somewhat different but a "subspecies" refers to two plants whose geographic areas do NOT overlap, meaning there is no possible gene flow between them, a "variety" applies to two similar species whose geographic areas DO overlap and therefore, gene flow is possible or likely.

I thought it was an interesting concept.

- While this is just an empirical statement and nothing scientific, I have noticed that many of my successful orchids needed two years to be really, fully established. Two years seems to be when they really start making you happy and put their show on steroids.
- Regardless of this "two year-rule", orchids which are grown well improve over time: more flowers, more spikes, bigger flowers etc... So your babies reward you for your good work by improving over time, which should make you all fuzzy inside.
- When you water your orchids, you should always soak them very well. It is particularly true for Vandas which are thirsty orchids. To make sure they are properly hydrated, make sure their roots turn green. That usually means coming back two or three times within a matter of minutes or watering it for a



little longer until the roots turn really green.

- Repotting and rest periods for <u>species</u> are critical. Research them carefully before acting. <u>Hybrids</u> are usually more tolerant, but repotting should always happen when the plant is growing (roots or bulbs, preferably roots).
- While you can keep the inflorescence on a large Phalaenopsis, you could get one more bloom, but expect fewer flowers and a more unruly display and the reblooming is not guaranteed. Small Phalaenopsis ("Polychilos" section) on the other hand, often have spikes that will stay green after the blooms have faded, and you should not cut them unless they turn brown. Some of these spikes can rebloom for many years.
- Dendrobiums and Cattleyas have roots that cling to pots.
 Repotting sets them back. Dendrobiums are notoriously adverse to repotting. So instead of repotting, you can do the

"Russian doll" trick and put your pot in a larger one or break the old pot while avoiding damaging roots and put in larger one. Just a thought.

- them hydrated and mitigate the shock from a more permanent state of moisture to full aeration
- Watering needs vary tremendously based on humidity, light, length of day and temperatures. In the Winter when temperatures and humidity are lower and the days are short, orchids need much less water. It is obviously the opposite in the summer.
- ♦ When the weather forecast calls for really cool nights ahead (like 55 and lower), be proactive and refrain from watering orchids a few days ahead of time, especially Phals that rot easily if they are wet during a cold night. In general orchids should not be too moist during colder days or nights.
- ♦ Always disinfect your cutting tool after EACH use. There are many ways to do so. I use a Mapp gas torch with blue flame (Claire taught me a lighter is not good enough.) but many disinfectants are also available. Ask other FLOS members for their best practice. There are many.



It's time to cull through your collection and dispose of any orchids that look like they are on their last legs or move them to the ICU area most of us have in a corner somewhere. You can repot any orchids you didn't get to in the spring or purchased over the summer and remove larger keikis to mount or pot so they will be well established by winter.

After struggling to survive the harsh South Florida summer, most of my orchids are either blooming or in bud. There are new "surprises" most every morning, and I can actually be outside to enjoy them instead of looking through my windows. With dead or dying orchids removed, there's room for more orchids! Of course, I could always get Scott to build me another shade house if I go completely crazy!

MILLION ORCHID PROJECT UPDATE



This past month was a busy one! We collected *E. tampensis* seed capsules from Flamingo Gardens, downtown Fort Lauderdale, and Riverbend Park in Jupiter. We kept some for local propagation and sent the rest to Fairchild Tropical Botanic Garden and to Orchids Dominicana, the grower who is producing the

bulk of our seedlings. In Riverbend Park we did a little experiment and put seed directly on five or six branches. Come back in two years for the results!
