Phalaenopsis Species, Part 1

Phalaenopsis are not exactly the most exotic orchids, given their wide availability. Most big box store Phals are so hybridized that no one bothers with their "backgrounds." Depending on which article you read, the "headcount" for the number of species in any genus is never the same. So, let's say there are over 75 species in the Phalaenopsis genus...

However, there are many gorgeous *Phalaenopsis* species that may be overlooked. Many are available

quite readily at orchid shows or online.

Most *Phalaenopsis* species are small plants with small flowers. The larger plants/flowers are best known and usually hail from the Philippines. The most famous are the large white *Phal. amabilis* and *aphrodite*, which are in the background of so many of our hybrids; but there are also a couple of very beautiful *Phals*. that can turn into huge specimen: *Phal. schilleriana* and *Phal. stuartiana*. There is also *Phal. sanderiana* which resembles *schilleriana* but seems to be less popular.



Phal. schilleriana is delicate pink with an intoxicating rose fragrance in the morning. The older the blooms, the stronger the fragrance that can carry for several feet! This species has a root system that is very aggressive and will attach to anything it finds. A mature plant will have very long inflorescences with hundreds

of flowers. Its mottled leaves indicate these are low light plants (lower than your average *Phal.*). They are spring bloomers, and the flowers last about a month. Like most species, they only bloom once per year. After flowering, they usually take a break for a month or so.
