## Cattleyas take center stage

Cattleyas are Segundo Cuesta's passion.

The long-time Miami grower, who owns Quest Orchids with his wife Yolanda, will present "Growing Cattlevas in South Florida" at our monthly meeting at 7:30 p.m. Aug. 8. His program will cover culture, disease and pest control of the beloved plants.

Segundo started collecting orchids after graduating from Florida International University in 1980, and hybridizing orchids in 1984. His goal was to make new crosses of compact cattleyas with art-shade tones which feature strikingly vibrant color combinations with contrasting lips. Segundo and Yolanda founded Ouest Orchids in 1994.

## Growing Orchids With Olivier Sections and subgroups of common genera

When you buy or consider buying an orchid and you are not sure about basic care (light, water, winter rest, temperatures, etc.), it is useful to understand which subgroup, if any, within their genus plants belong to. I will



describe what I consider to be the most important subgroup for some of our most common genera.

Most genera have sections and subsections, but while they are very relevant in the Dendrobium genus to understand care, they may not be so relevant for other genera.

**Dendrobium:** This is one of the two largest genera in the orchid family, the other one being Bulbophyllum. Those orchids have varied needs as they grow everywhere in Asia and Australia. There are dozens of different sections and knowing which section a plant belongs to will tell you a lot about how to care for it.

The website <u>OrchidSpecies.com</u> is usually a good source to find out which section your Dendrobium belongs to.

A good example is the Callista section with *Den. lindleyi* (syn. *aggregatum*). All plants belonging to this section need moderate light and an extensive rest in winter. They also are evergreen (many Dendrobiums are deciduous).

Another popular section is Spatulata (better known as Antelope dendrobiums). They need very high light and water year-round with no rest.

So, plants from these two sections have vastly different needs. Dendrobium sections are reasonably well defined and this is a good approach to understanding your plant's needs.

Cattleyas: More important in Cattleyas is to know whether you are dealing with a unifoliate (one leaf) or bifoliate (two or three leaves). The types of flowers are very different, while care is similar, except when it comes to repotting and rest.

Unifoliate Cattleyas usually, but not always, have large flowers with frilly edges and a thin texture. There are a few flowers per spike. They are easier to grow than bifoliates as they are less finicky about repotting timing.

Bifoliate Cattleyas have smaller flowers, but a lot more of them; they are usually fairly waxy with heavy texture and saturated colors. It is critical to repot a bifoliate Cattleya species when it starts growing roots. Bad timing is usually fatal to the plant.

Some bifoliate Cattleyas need a rest and others do not.

**Phalaenopsis:** Most need similar care but a small group are colder growers. The vast majority though will grow well in South Florida as they are warm growers.

While the Phalaenopsis genus has well defined sections and getting to know them has value to improving care, the most important *basic* distinction to remember in this genus is between the large Phal plants with (usually) large flowers and long spikes and smaller plants with small flowers and usually small, few-flowered spikes. The large Phals bloom in the spring as their bloom is triggered by colder nights during fall and winter. Small Phals bloom in the summer as blooming is triggered by heat and long days.

Vandas: Focusing on sections is not important because they all need similar care. What matters most is to know which ones are colder growers (very few) and which ones are truly cold intolerant at night.


Catasetum: The beauty of this genus is that there is no need to differentiate care from one plant to another. For the most part, they all behave the same way. Critical here is to understand their growing cycle and respect it. Learn more by watching my Youtube videos by searching "Orchid House – Fort Lauderdale, Florida."

**Oncidiums:** I don't believe sections in this genus are very well defined. Their classification is subject to much debate.

All Oncidiums need to get a clear wet and dry cycle and overwatering is a death sentence. Also, you need to research whether or not your Oncidium is a warm or hot grower. Understanding temperature requirements is critical in this genus as they vary vastly from species to species and many are in reality not suitable for South Florida.

## FLOS Auction: The gift that keeps on giving

Now is a good time to go through your orchid collection to identify plants to donate to the FLOS auction scheduled for the Oct. 10 meeting. The proceeds of the auction benefit our orchid society and donors benefit from getting some much-needed breathing room in their growing areas to make space for all the new acquisitions that they will surely bring home from auctions and upcoming orchid shows.

Many of us have duplicates from past divisions that we could share. Eventually we lose interest in some orchids and refocus our attention on other objects of orchid desire. Sometimes an orchid does not live up to expectations (thought it would be fragrant but it isn't, thought it would stay miniature but it got too big, thought you could

rebloom it but after trying for several years you have lost patience, etc.).

It may be too late to make new potted plants from divisions as there is insufficient time for them to get well enough established in containers before the auction. However, those orchids that thrive on mounts such as Brassavolas and

Dendrobiums could still be divided and mounted for the auction. Make a note of any of your orchids such as *Oncidium sphacelatum* (Dancing Lady) or *Vanilla planifolia*, that are best mounted directly on a tree, and plan to donate those divisions as bare root when the time comes for drop off.

Continue to practice monthly preventive pesticide and fungicide treatments so the orchids that you donate will all be pest and disease free. And please do not donate any of your orchids if you are not diligent about sterilizing your orchid cutting tools as they may have viruses and contaminate another collection. Be sure to attach a correct identification tag, and if possible, include details about the potting media, last repotting date and any growing tips which may help the new grower be successful.


