Exposito's 'Orchid Survival Guide'

Jose Exposito of Soroa Orchids in Homestead will present his "Orchid Survival Guide" at 7:30 p.m. March 11. Members will learn basic growing information with emphasis on water, light, air and fertilizing with tips on repotting and pest control. There will be a short Q&A session at the end.

Jose, who founded Soroa in 1985, was born in Cuba and emigrated to America during the 1980 Mariel Boat Lift.

He is a well known grower who has won numerous awards for his Phalaenopsis breeding program. He is a senior judge of the American Orchid Society as well as a world lecturer who has given presentations at the World Orchid Conference in Brazil and Malaysia.

He is a past board member of the South Florida Orchid Society, past president of the East Everglades Orchid Society and the Coalition for Orchid Species. He also is the Orchid Curator at the Bonnet House in Fort Lauderdale.

Soroa Orchids, at 25750 SW 177th Ave. in Homestead, is a wonderful grower to visit. The front entryway is full of



award plaques from the American Orchid Society.

Jose will be bringing plants to sell as well as supplying our raffle table.

Growing Orchids With Olivier

Vanda tessellata: Gorgeous flowers, musky fragrance

Vanda tessellata is not just a gorgeous flower but the species has some very attractive features.

- Unlike most Vanda species, this one can bloom several times per year when mature. It typically blooms from spring till fall.
- The flowers are very well spaced, which makes for a nice presentation and they also have a strong, pleasant, musky fragrance during certain times of day.
- The plant is smaller than most Vandas which is valuable as many are quite large.
- The flowers usually have a lip color that is strikingly different from the petals/sepals; there are many different varieties.

Vanda tessellata has a very wide geographical distribution which indicates it is more tolerant of various



growing conditions. That includes higher tolerance for colder nights (mid to high 40's) and very high temperatures. In winter, it tends to slow down a bit, and watering needs are (somewhat) lower.

Hybrids which have *V. tessellata* in the background usually bloom most of the year and can withstand colder nights. That is an extremely desirable feature obviously.

From a presentation I attended at the West Palm Beach Judging Center, I got the following added bit of information on varieties:

Northern plants (from the Himalayas) are different from southern plants but they share remarkably similar lip structures. Southern plants (subspecies tessellate) are larger, have larger flowers and fewer flowers on shorter spikes. They are extremely variable in color but gray flowers with blue lips are the most common color form. Northern plants (subspecies tesselloides) are much smaller, with longer spikes and more flowers and their color range is very limited: creamy white overlaid with distinct tessellation in shades of pink or reddish brown.
