### **Growing Orchids With Olivier: Catasetums**

Catasetum growing season is coming to an end and not all Catasetums are created equal when it comes to dormancy: some Catasetums have a very short or no dormancy at all. They start growing new bulbs before even shedding all their leaves from the previous growing season. Others can have a dormancy of 2, 3 or even 4 months!

The species which grow in areas with year-round humidity and identical growing conditions year-round will have very short dormancies. Species which grow in areas with a protracted dry season will have longer dormancies.

Ctsm. pileatum, Ctsm. saccatum, Ctsm. tenebrosum and Ctsm. lucis typically have a short dormancy or none at all. Ctsm. expansum, Ctsm. fimbriatum, Ctsm. tabulare, Ctsm. schmidtianum have a more standard dormancy of 1 to 2 months. Ctsm. denticulatum, Ctsm. tigrinum, Ctsm. spitzii, Ctsm. vinaceum have the longest dormancies at 3 or more months

If you have a hybrid, check the background of your hybrid and it will tell you what you can expect. You can check the background of your hybrid on <a href="https://orchidroots.com">orchidroots.com</a>.

Most hybrid caatsetums have dormancies of 1 to 2 months.

In terms of how long blooms last and how often plants bloom: the Catasetum alliance has 4 main genera: Catasetum, Clowesia, Cycnoches and Mormodes and intergeneric hybrids which are a combination of all these genera.

Catasetums can bloom 3 to 4 times per season when mature and well grown. This is why their blooming season is quite extensive, mainly from June till November but you can have blooms from April through January since there are late bloomers like *Ctsm. spitzii* and *lucis*. Male flowers are short lived (1 to 2 weeks typically) while female flowers can last up to 6 weeks.



Catasetum spitzii

A late bloomer with a strong pineapple scent that has a very long dormancy of 4 or more months which means less work for you!

It has a very glossy lip (red or yellow typically)

Clowesia is a very small genus of 7 species and there are 2 types: Green flowers which bloom once in June/July and pink flowers which bloom once in winter on leafless bulbs

There are no male/female flowers and the blooms are long lasting (one month or more).

Cycnoches usually only bloom once in the fall or very early winter. Male flowers are shorter lived than female flowers. Mormodes bloom once, typically in the winter or even early spring, typically on leafless bulbs. No male/female flowers and flowers should last 2-4 weeks

The nothogenera which combine 2 or more of these 4 genera have all "perfect flowers" (no female and male flowers).

Clowesetums which combine Catasetums and Clowesia are a great pick because they combine all the advantages of each genus: long lived flowers, very floriferous and they can flower 2 to 3 times per season.

Cycnodes which combine Mormodes and Cycnoches can bloom twice.

Mormodia which combine Mormodes and Clowesia blooms once in late season on leafless bulbs but the flowers last 2 to 4 weeks and they are very floriferous.

Our November Speaker is Francisco Miranda, Miranda Orchids, speaking about "Brazilian Orchid Habitats - The Amazon" on November 11, 2024 @ 7:30 pm to 9:30 pm.

A taxonomist, naturalist and orchid grower, Francisco travels extensively in the U.S. and internationally speaking at orchid-related events

and meetings. He has been doing this since 1988, while still living in Brazil. The subjects of his presentations reflect Francisco's extensive travels to study orchids in their natural environments.

"Miranda Orchids started in 1999 and is a nursery specializing in growing mainly selected *Cattleya* alliance species. In a sense, it is a continuation of Boa Vista Orchids, a nursery we ran in Brazil from 1986 until we moved to the U.S.A. Many of the plants available are produced in our lab and nursery in Central Florida from our extensive collection of stud plants.

The rest we bring from Brazil to increase variety and novelty. Being native Brazilians, and having had a nursery for many years, we know that there is a lot of development in *Cattleya* species being done there. This is mostly because a lot of those species are native from Brazil (including all the bifoliate cattleyas) and because these plants are favorites of growers there." Sara Singer, Program Chair

Mac along with Andrew Collins covered numerous aspects of orchid growing and especially in the fall with diminishing sun intensity the importance of proper watering, using epsom salt to prevent orchid leaves from turning red, and ensuring our orchids are enjoying as much morning sun as possible. Orchid retail therapy capped off the morning.

Then on October 19 the Keikis were treated to a beautiful morning at member and AOS judge Tony Millet's growing area. Tony has an extensive collection of Cattleya orchids many of which are his own hybrid crosses. His topic "A Guide to Good Growing Orchids" taught us more about proper watering--Tony uses only rain water and prefers the mist setting on his sprayer. He likes using live moss and believes in its advantage to produce "happy plants". To the shock and amazement of many Keikis, Tony without hesitation rigorously pulled apart an overgrown Cattleya. After demonstrating how he repots, several Keikis had the opportunity for a hands on repotting lesson.

Both gatherings were a wonderful way to spend a Saturday morning and everyone left with not only a raffle prize but with a number of great ideas to grow their orchids better. Thank you to all who contributed to the array of yummy goodies and of course, extra special thanks to our hosts, Mac, Andrew, and Tony.

## **Show Prizes, Ribbons & Cash**

During our January Show we have AOS orchid judges (the big guys!) who come and look at submitted entries and give ribbons but there are also cash prizes!

There is a \$200 cash award for the Grand Champion Flower (hobbyist only)

There is a \$100 cash award to a hobbyist for the best quality flower from any genus

There is also a \$50 cash award from The Oliver C. Mundson Award Trust Fund for the best Vanda species or hybrid entered by a hobby grower (only)

Besides these 3 awards that are reserved for hobbyists and exclude commercial vendors, there are also 18 other cash awards for categories that usually are awarded to commercial growers but that you could get if your plant is outstanding.

One possibility is a plant that you submit in the keiki exhibit.

The only way to win a cash award is to submit an entry! So bring your best flowering orchid to the show on Wednesday afternoon. The judges give out awards on Thursday and then the plants are to be admired by all Show goers for the next 3 days. You can get your plant back on Sunday at 4 pm.

Your plant must be free of pests and diseases, have a proper ID (tag) and should be properly groomed (clean leaves, remove dead spikes and damaged leaves etc..) and nicely presented (stakes, nice pot etc..).

There are \$350 up for grabs! Come get it!
