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Mac's Orchids display at the show



When you buy an orchid species, you should research its growing needs and that includes researching where it grows in nature and at what altitude (it is usually referred to in meters).

Altitudes below 1,000 meters (3,000') in tropical countries usually indicate warm or hot growing species (although that may not be true everywhere). Altitudes from 1,000 to 2,000 meters (3 to 6,000') are more intermediate growers and above that you are dealing with cool and cold growing orchids. These are rule of thumbs, not 100% guaranteed.

Where it grows also teaches you about geography and if you learn what climate reigns in that area (if it is homogeneous at all), then you can keep that in mind for other orchids which grow in the same area.

I bought a *Gongora chocoensis* a few years ago and discovered it was endemic to Colombia and more specifically the Department of Choco, hence its name since names ending in -ENSIS typically denote a geographical origin (Costaricensis e.g.). I researched it and discovered Choco was in NW Colombia abutting Panama. That led me to realize that Colombia has Departments while I knew that Brazil had States like us. I also identified Antioquia as a major department with many orchids.

Later I read that most orchids growing in Choco are exposed to warm temperatures year-round and extremely wet weather but while night-times are high (in the 60's and higher) day-time seldom exceed low to mid 80'ies. I also bought *Embreea rodigasiana* (which is basically a one flowered Stanhopea) which is also endemic to Choco. Now I know that both plants coming from Choco should preferably not stay outside if night-temps drop below 50 F and should be dry if temps drop below 55 F (a dry medium is critical when night-time temps are lower than 55/60 F). It also means that our summer temps can be too high, hence the need for proper ventilation, fans and also more shade, both plants growing in fairly shady conditions to begin with.


By the way, Colombia has apparently the greatest number of endemic species of orchids according to Orchid Digest (David Haelterman, Q4 2024).

I also have several Catasetums originating from the State of Mato Grosso in Brazil. I have learned that the State enjoys a very protracted dry season and hence I know these Catasetums will have long dormancies and are very resistant to drought. You must make the same assumption for any orchid coming from that State.

The island of Borneo is the ultimate tropical destination. It enjoys year-round temperatures in the 80's and low 90's and heavy rainfall most of the year. So, you know that any plant coming from there (ALL four Paraphalaenopsis are endemic to Borneo e.g.) should be watered heavily and will thrive in our weather but you should be wary when night time drops below 65 F.

So, the beauty with orchid growing is that you also learn about geography and climatology and plenty of other stuff.


Orchid Renaissance, an amazing, successful 65th anniversary show for the Fort Lauderdale Orchid Society!
