## May speaker: Dr Courtney Hackney, "Re-blooming Orchids"



Dr. Hackney will be our May 12<sup>th</sup> speaker. He is Emeritus Professor of Biology and the former Director of Coastal Biology at the University of North Florida in Jacksonville, Florida. Previously he was Professor of Biology and Marine Biology at the University of North Carolina-Wilmington. Courtney began growing orchids in the Florida Keys in 1962, while working for a small orchid nursery. He has continued his interest in both orchid hybridizing and orchid culture since then. He grows many different genera, but his favorite is the Cattleya Alliance. He has about 500 mature cattleyas and even more seedlings, but his favorites are classic clones, some of which appeared in orchid collections over 100 years ago. He makes 10-15 hybrids and species sib crosses per year in various genera.

He wrote a Growing Tips column for 20 years, which ended in December 2013. Growing Tips appeared in newsletters around the country. He has also published in the Orchid Digest and Orchids. In 2004, he published "American Cattleyas", the culmination of a decade of study and interviews with many of the "Orchid Greats", which summarizes in old photographs and print how all of the modern cattleyas came to be. The book also describes what we know about cattlevas and cattleya hybrids, how to grow them, and what to expect from modern hybrids. During the past decade he has been researching the coerulea (blue) color

form of cattleya species and hybrids, which was completed and published in 2018.

He is a member of the American, St Augustine, Jacksonville, and Cape Fear, NC orchid societies. During the Pandemic he has been hosting the monthly "Show Table" of the St Augustine Orchid Society via ZOOM, many of which are available on the society web site.

He and his wife Rose live in Jacksonville, Florida adjacent to a tidal swamp. Rose retired as a professional artist in 2017, but continues painting for fun. His orchids reside in a 24'x25' Florida shade house adjacent to the swamp. He grows many interesting orchids in the trees by the swamp.

Growing Orchids With Olivier

### The small fragrant Phalaenopsis violacea species

It might be counterintuitive since we all see the large flowered Phalaenopsis for sale at big box retailers, but 90% of the Phalaenopsis species are small plants with small flowers and the majority are fragrant, unlike most large Phalaenopsis.

I believe that among the most popular small species are the "violacea" type. There are actually three different violacea Phals:




1) *Phal. violacea* proper (first column) is from Sumatra; it has many different colors in the pink/purple hues but there is also an alba form (alba means white).

2) Phal. bellina is a variety that comes from Borneo and until 1995 it was called Phal. violacea var. Borneo. Its leaves are wider and the flower color are very striking with green

edges and a pinkish lip. It does not bloom as often as violacea and is somewhat harder to grow. 3) *Phal. mentawaiensis* is less common and comes from the Mentawai island (off Sumatra), hence its name. It could be described as a violacea with a much longer inflorescence is and larger flower. *Phal. mentawaiensis* 'Pink Lady' x self



Continues on next page Page 2 All three are among the most fragrant Phals. *Phal. violacea* has a spicy fragrance while *Phal. bellina* has a rather sweet fragrance.

"They bloom mostly in the summer and fall. Older inflorescences should never be removed as long as they are green as they can rebloom." The violacea Phals need true shade. Also, they rot easily from the crown in the winter; therefore, the medium should be kept away from the bottom of the crown and they should be kept drier when night time temperatures are in the 50's. Personally, I prefer mounting them to avoid rot. They are also hot growers and nights below 55 F should be avoided.

## Wild Orchids in South Florida

If your calendar isn't already full with orchid shows, repotting tasks, and checking on your tropical beauties, here's one more must-do for May: get out and see our native orchids in the wild—yes, right here.

South Florida is home to an impressive variety of native orchid species, many of which are blooming now or just about to. While it's easy to get wrapped up in caring for our exotic collections, we sometimes overlook the remarkable orchids growing naturally all around us—in hammocks, swamps, and even along shaded trails just minutes from home.



April kicks off prime orchidspotting season in the region. Species like the Encyclia tampensis aka Florida butterfly orchid (shown left) and Eulophia alta might be found depending on habitat, while eagle-eyed adventurers may be lucky enough to spot a ghost orchid (Dendrophylax lindenii) if conditions are right later in the season. Even some of the lesser-known terrestrial species

like Spiranthes can be real gems.

To plan your local orchid outing, check with Florida Parks for guidance on where native species are likely to be found and remember, many native orchids are protected, so take only photos and leave the plants undisturbed. If you are going to be traveling a great online resource is Go Orchids, where you can search by state and season to find which species are blooming and how to spot them.

Taking a break from potting benches and humidity trays to immerse yourself in a native orchid habitat isn't just refreshing—it reconnects us with the bigger picture of orchid appreciation and conservation. Plus, a little time in nature has been shown to boost mental clarity and energy, which we can all use this time of year.

So grab your camera, hat, and bug spray, and hit the trail—your local orchids are waiting!
